 - When online worship attendance is calculated for the ELCA, it increases to 105 people per week; this is based on the number of views at least one minute in length, multiplied by 2. In addition, we broadcast worship on the radio weekly as a 50+ year outreach to the wider community and to our homebound members. In 2024 we hand-delivered an average of 20 bulletins each week to members worshiping with us via the radio.

St. Peter Ev. Lutheran Church Annual Congregational Meeting Minutes Sunday, January 21, 2024

Call to order – Meeting was called to order at 10:19 a.m. by Aaron LaHaie, Church Council President

Opening Prayer and Devotion (page 1 and inside back cover) – Pastor Miranda Klosterboer Synod Update – Message from Bishop Felix Malpica via video

Approval of Minutes – A motion to approve the 2023 Annual Meeting Minutes was made by Rick Lenz, 2nd by Vivian Achenbach. All in favor, motion carried.

Overall, 2023 was mostly as expected/budgeted. Major 11, Mission Support, actual 2023 come in at \$341,978 from budgeted \$351,832 due to envelope offerings being down. Major 13, Designated Offerings, actual 2023 came in at \$37,098 compared to budgeted \$11,500. This was due to funding received for the piano, stoves, and bells. The bells and piano were funded through individual fundraising and the stoves were funded by the Women of the ELCA – all of which did not impact the budget. Major 25, Part Time Office, was a result of the overlap of Theresa's retirement and onboarding Robbie.

A motion to accept the 2023 Treasurer's Report was made by Luann Neumann, 2nd by Al Bunders. All in favor, motion carried.

Ministry Reports (pages 9-16) – Please take some time to read about all the wonderful things our committees and volunteers are doing here at St. Peter.

Mike McCoy, Church Council Vice President, and Head Trustee, gave a message of thanks and gratitude, highlighting some of the many ways our volunteers care for St. Peter. The Women of the ELCA for purchasing the stoves and refrigerator for the kitchen, as well as the upstairs refrigerator; Jeff Mink for his expertise and skills; Aaron LaHaie for his leadership and "getting things done"; Al Bunders for all his work at the parsonage; John Howe for snow removal; and the ladies of the church for all the beautiful painting and updates.

Nominations Committee Report (page 17) – Kathy Quamme

"Thank you" to the nominating committee and gratitude to those outgoing members of Church Council – Mary Peterson, Jan Weisensale, and Ruby Koeller.

Church Council Elections – The nominating committee presents Linda Shihata (2nd term), Michael Douglass, Jolene Atkins, Penny Ohlert, and Jasmine Olmstead as nominees for Church Council. A motion to accept these five nominees as new members of the

- Church Council was made by Mary Jorgensen, 2nd by Cindy Standorf. All in favor, motion carried.
- **Synod Assembly Voting Members** Synod Assembly 2024 will take place June 7-9 at Three Bears Lodge in Warrens, WI. No volunteers were identified. Moved to Church Council.
- Sugar Creek Bible Camp Annual Meeting Voting Delegates The 2024 Annual Meeting will take place on February 18 at 2:00 p.m. No volunteers were identified. Moved to Church Council.
- Nomination Committee Elections for 2024 Nominees/volunteers to join the 2024 Nomination Committee are Jan Weisensale, Jeff Mink, Alex Jackson, and Pat Lenz. Additional nominees to consider and invite are outgoing Church Council members Mary Peterson and Ruby Koeller. Moved to Church Council for approval of complete list of nominations once determined.

Old Business – Many of the items discussed at last year's meeting have been completed. The Women of the ELCA donated a new stove and refrigerator to the kitchen; Council Member names and photos are posted on the back wall; Come for Supper is now back to being held in-house; and a new piano was acquired.

New Business – Open to the floor for ideas. Luanne Neumann voiced her support of global mission and urged for continued support and importance of maintaining global contact. St. Peter previously supported Pastor Kyle Svennungsen and family who are now back in the U.S.

2024 Budget Review and Approval (2nd to last page)

Conservative approach with only 3% increase from 2023. If Stewardship Campaign is successful, this will be closer to 6-7%.

We are looking at \$380,057 for total expenses and \$358,116 for total income, resulting in a deficit of \$21,941. A negative number never feels good, but this is almost half of what we experienced during the last period of sustaining two pastors. It is the hope that with a successful Stewardship Campaign that we will close this gap.

Per inquiry from the floor, the Evangelism/Fellowship budget has increased to help achieve our goal of "Growing Christian Community".

A motion to accept the 2024 Budget was made by Jeff Mink, 2nd by Betty Keehner.



 - A Membership Team was formed to look carefully over our membership database. They have been reaching out to




Outdoor Worship at the River

- members, seeking to encourage engagement; updating our database; and creating communications for invitation. This team will continue it's work in 2025.
- We had an "Open Pew" the day of the Election, with open times for prayer and reflection and resources available for individual Scripture reading, music, and prayer as well.
- We offered 4 "Worship Walk" experiences at La Riviere Park, where people could connect with God, nature, and one another.
- We welcomed 30 New Members to our congregation in 2024 and we are enriched by their presence among us.
- Thank you to our volunteers! It is so awesome to see the many ways that you serve God and neighbor with joy here at St. Peter. There is committed lay leadership of committees and teams. Faithful servants are supporting all areas of worship, welcome, teaching, administration, mission, youth, meals, care for one another, and outreach. Thank you!!



- Our in-person worship attendance has continued to grow. Welcoming our newest brothers in Christ. The number of people worshipping with us via the radio and online has also grown. We have some regular visitors joining us from the east coast, Texas, Washington. and even Norway.
- Retreats and Renewal Days with different groups are a highlight of ministry for me: In 2024, I was able to be a part of a Church Council Development Day, First Communion Retreat, Youth Gathering Retreat, Middle School Confirmation Retreat, 9th Grade Confirmation Retreat, Outdoor Work days at Sugar Creek, and a Women's Renewal Event at St. Peter.
- Pastoral Care in times of Grief and transition. It is inspiring to see the ways in which you care for one another, and it is an honor to come alongside individuals and families in these times. I am thankful for the good news of Christ's love and the gift of eternal life that Christ gives as we gather.
- We continued to strengthen ministry with and for High School Students. This new ministry has been growing in numbers. We were able to send a team to the ELCA Youth Gathering in 2024. Other events included: a retreat at Sugar Creek Bible Camp, preparation meetings for the ELCA Youth Gathering, Youth-Led Worship services, twice-monthly Youth Group nights during the school year (with opportunities for sharing, prayer, games, service, and connection).

- We give thanks to God for the bequests and special gifts that have been received in 2024. On behalf of the church council and the entire congregation we give thanks to God for JoAnne and Jim White (JoAnne named St. Peter as a beneficiary of an IRA); Susan and Joseph Ludvik (Susan named St. Peter in her will); Floyd and Norma Welsch (St. Peter was a recipient of Floyd's estate). "Gifts and Bequests" also includes Memorials and Special Gifts. We give thanks to God for the many Memorials received in memory of loved ones. We give thanks to God for the special gift given to St. Peter from Frank and Mary Weeks (gift of stocks). Gifts like these help keep St. Peter healthy and thriving.
- Trust in Leadership: A special thank you to our Church Council, Trustees, and Leadership Teams. Your faithful leadership, discernment, and stewardship of resources is such a blessing to this community. The

regular giving and bequests received this year are a testimony to the trust the congregation has in you and to the mission and ministry that people see done in Jesus' name through St. Peter. Thank you.

- An Endowment Policy and Gift Policy were created and approved by the Church Council. These documents as well as a summary document are available now. In 2025, we are also looking forward to an Estate Planning lunch hosted at St. Peter on February 12th.
- Our outreach has maintained and strengthened as well.

 These vibrant ministries are a part of us loving our community. We host an NA Meeting in our building, Handy Home Ministries completed two projects, we maintain a Little Free Pantry, and our Come For Supper free meal is a source of needed fellowship and food for the community. We continue to share the good news of Jesus: the Prison Ministry leading worship services at the Prairie du Chien Correctional Institution, a 55+ year radio ministry, a 4+ year online ministry offering worship through Facebook, Worship services at Prairie Maison and Bluff Haven. Hands-on projects continue as well: "God's Work. Our Hands." serving days, food drives for the Coullee Cap Food pantry, sending encouragement to graduates and those in the nursing home continue as well, and making quilts for Lutheran World Relief.
- Eligible for a Sabbatical Leave. After March 2nd, I will have served as Senior Pastor of St. Peter Ev. Lutheran Church for 5 years. According to the current La Crosse Area Synod Guidelines, a rostered leader is eligible for a Sabbatical Leave of 3 months after 5 years in their current. I will work with the Church Council, the Mutual Ministry Committee, and the Bishop to discuss this further and to work out details.

As we head into 2025, there are many things to look forward to as we continue to strengthen mission and ministry and partner with others in our community. We Care. We Build Discipleship. We Give.

- Develop a Care Minister Team, with training and planning beginning in 2025
- Receive training to begin offering a Grief Support Group
- Bring back Sugar Creek Bible Camp Counselors for VBS
- Plan to offer an Intergenerational Mission Trip
- Send a team on a High School Mission Trip to Buffalo, New York
- Offer expanded First Communion Retreat options as we welcome more children to the table.
- Emphasize opportunities for adults to connect with one another and to grow in faith, by supporting the formation of additional adult fellowship and discipleship groups and events.
- Engage in meaningful times of community, fellowship, and vibrant worship during the Lenten season and other seasons of our worship life together.
- Plan for a 2nd summer with well-advertised outdoor worship services: "Shall We Gather At the River"
- Continue development of our new Intergenerational Sunday School
- Continue to develop our High School Ministry Leadership Team
- Partner with the community and schools to develop a Community Suicide Postvention Plan
- Explore how our Handy Home Ministries might help with next steps that come from the newly formed community-wide Crawford County Housing Team
- Support the community effort going on now to offer a Drop-In Center in our Community.

2024 Report of Associate Pastor Ministry

Greetings to you, as we embark on another year of ministry together. It is an honor and blessing to be your pastor and serve beside so many of you. Our collective passions to share with the world messages of God's grace and peace are a gift to each other, the communities in which we live and the global church.

As I am reflecting on the year 2024, it seems that the year almost started off in the season of Lent, with Ash Wednesday occurring just six weeks into the year. Our Lenten mid-week worship series with "The Commute" skits really was a nice way to set the tone for an enthusiastic year of ministry.



I serve on the synod LYLE (Lutheran Youth Learning Evangelism) committee, which had quite a busy year. Aside from the National Youth Gathering over the summer, our team pulled off a great confirmation event in the fall. ConFest is a mini-festival, or synod ministries fair, for confirmation age youth to learn more about what their synod does and how to get involved. At one time, ConFest was an annual confirmation event within the La Crosse Area synod, as is in many synods across the Midwest, but it has been nearly a decade since the event had been held in our synod. The committee was proud to have been able to offer this event again and to have had such a great turn out (around 300 youth) and response. We are excited to get planning for ConFest 2025:)

Pr. Miranda and I hosted our South Conference monthly gathering of colleagues in April. The women's group of St. Peter put on a beautiful spread for us! And I was excited to have my good friend, Sister Julia Walsh (FSPA), be our guest speaker for the day. As I remember it, that month seemed to have some particularly nice weather days which added to the joy of being outdoors for some spring events such as the "God's Work. Our Hands." tree planting day and two retreats at Sugar Creek (pre-National Youth Gathering event and Planit workshop for church leaders).

Using the National Youth Gathering theme, Created to Be, I organized three Vacation Bible School events through the summer. First, was the regular VBS for grade school age children in our church and community. The week included visits with several special community organizations (Unity Day Center, Bluff Haven residents, Fire Department), which were both fun and a little challenging for the kids. A few weeks later, we had a family VBS on a Sunday afternoon. This event focused on expressing ourselves using different artistic mediums. Finally, there was an energetic morning for PreK and Kindergarten children to experi-



ence a little taste of VBS. We had songs, craft time, games, play time and a snack! None of these would have been much of a success without the variety of volunteers who took time out of their summer to share their faith and God-given talents with the children and families connected to this church. I am so grateful to all involved in these VBS events.

The synod put on several nice events for both learning and fellowship. Synod Assembly is a significant com-

mitment each year, but one that I always find to be rewarding. This year, at synod assembly, the idea of a synod-wide lay caring ministry was presented in one of the workshops. Having come to the workshop with some experience in this type of program and expressing an interest in seeing the new idea become a reality, I was asked to be on the directive board. Since then, training sessions have begun and applications are still being accepted. I would be more than happy to answer any questions if you are interested in becoming part of this ministry. Other synod-wide events I enjoyed this year include the Loggers Game and the social statements discussions on Civic Life and Faith.

In June, during a week many of our youth were at Sugar Creek, I spent the week as the camp on-site chaplain. Every year I look forward to this opportunity. Spending time in that valley is sacred to me and getting to do so alongside the



children and youth of St. Peter adds to the blessings of the week. It is a privilege getting to witness the ways in which these young people are challenged to grow and learn more about their faith. Camp gives kids an opportunity to discover who they are as a Christian, apart from the family with whom they attend worship at home. And, it is especially joyful to hear comments of how they feel different, in a good way, being separated from their electronic devices for a week;)

Late in the summer, we started offering additional opportunities for outdoor worship, in the form of Worship Walks. Two were held in the summer. Then one in the fall with the confirmation classes and one in December. All of these were held at La Riviere Park. Each experience was unique as the groups received what each season had to offer in how we become aware of God and life all around us. I and the worship team are planning to offer more Worship Walks in 2025.



This fall was a very busy season, as it tends to be each year. It started with the kick-off for our new program, Inter-Generational Ministry! What has been know as Sunday school time is now Inter-Generational time, offering an opportunity for the youngest and the oldest, and everyone in-between, to gather for a time to live into the part of our baptismal callings where we teach and learn from one another. Participants meet as one large group and the time is structured using the principles of Faith5; share, read, reflect, pray, bless. I am enjoying how this ministry allows participants' natural talents to be revealed and how we get to know one another on a more personal level.

God's Work. Our Hands. project for the fall was the assembly and distribution of laundry care kits. This has been a fun project all around. There are still several kits available for distribution, which would be a great way to earn some service hours for confirmation students:)

In the first two weeks of October, there were three substantial synod events; two of which I helped to organize. Fall Theological Retreat for synod clergy was held in Wisconsin Dells, during which we studied and discussed the gospel of Luke for the coming lectionary year. Next came ConFest, followed soon after by an evening at the jump park for youth; both were held in the La Crosse area.



The season of Advent, at the end of the year, always brings lots of activity. Each year we try to make space for and give recognition to the joy and the hardship that may be experienced. It was a delight having one of our newest families play a role in the Christmas program, this year. A big thank you to all who helped with set, props, costumes, scripts, video and sound. Special thanks is extended to our "Holly Family" players, the Gingrich Family; Danny, Aspen, Bexley and Ledger:)

In this season also, as a way to acknowledge the pain that many of us feel during the holidays, noticing the absence of family and friends over the years, it is becoming a tradition to offer what is known as a "Blue Christmas" service. It is an opportunity to make space for a quieter, slower worship; tending to aching hearts.

One ministry I have been particularly passionate about this year is the development of a daytime, drop-in center for those needing a healthy and supportive environment to encourage their recovery process. It is still in developmental stages, but I look forward to sharing the progress with you all as this important ministry opportunity continues to take shape.



Handy Home Ministries Annual Report 2024

This year our team accomplished two projects, one of which was a major bath-room rebuild. We also invested in community networks working to address the issue of housing in our community. We work with referrals and support from our community partners Community Development Alternatives, Inc., Crawford County Aging and Disability Resource Center, and Crawford County Health and Human Services.

Project one: Rebuild of a bathroom. An elderly woman and her disabled son were living in a home without a functional bathroom. The floor was rotting out, and it was unsafe. This project included rebuilding the floor; assisting with plumbing; and installing a new sink, bathtub, and vanity.

Project two: Building stairs for a mobile home, so that a young family could have a 2nd working exit. Homeowner's insurance company deemed the absence of stairs going out the back door was a safety hazard and requested that a land-

dce dblanning, our team determined fe exit in case of an emergen-

ing, with stairs, be installed in order for the policy to continue. During project planning, our team determined that replacing the exterior door for this exit would be a benefit to ensuring a safe exit in case of an emergency.

Additional projects were also investigated. In addition, some volunteers got some skills practice with an outdoor staining project at the parsonage on a "God's Work. Our Hands." Day of service this past summer when other smaller community projects were being addressed as well.

Addressing Housing on the County Level:

- Crawford County Housing Meetings: Both Pastor Miranda and Pastor Hillary have been involved in the Crawford County Housing Meetings where community leaders from Crawford County and surrounding area are strategizing next steps to address the shortage of housing, quality of housing, and shortage of affordable housing in our county. Pastor Miranda continues to attend meetings regularly.
- Crawford County Emergency Food and Shelter Board: Pastor Miranda has also served on the board for Emergency Food and Shelter in Crawford County, which is working to release funds for Crawford County to address emergency food and housing needs.

As we head into 2025:

- We are looking for additional administrative assistance for this team. This could include helping with: communicating requests, working to source funding for materials, coordinating meetings, etc..
- We are looking for additional project leaders willing to make contact with homeowners, figure out what needs to be done, estimate and coordinate material purchases, and then do the work and direct the work.
- If you are willing to be a leader or you are willing to help in an administrative capacity, please let one of the pastors know.
- We also may be looking to expand partnerships with other community volunteers. It will also be exciting
 to see if there are ways that we can assist with next steps that come out of the wider Crawford County
 Housing Committee.

This year marked the second full year of St Peter's Handy Home Ministries actively working in the community. Many thanks to those who have supported this ministry in 2024.

Healing Connections Committee Annual Report for 2024

We provided materials at the church for individuals who might be looking to locate a 12-step program and provided information about a drop box to dispose of unwanted prescription drugs. We had representatives from the treatment court staff the table at the entry for Come for Supper so that people could learn more about that program. We again had a bulletin board display including materials promoting that all are welcome and accepted here and that we are all connected and need to support one another.

We had Dawn Adams from the Crawford County Public Health Department present to our committee about the concerns of opioid overdoses which are increasing in our area. She provided us with Narcan that is available both in the fellowship room and in the kitchen with the first aid items. It is administered just like a nasal spray. It can be administered by anyone and to anyone without specialized training.

Some of the members of our committee have been working on a project to establish a recovery drop-in center in our community. It would provide a safe and sober place for social interaction and would also provide meetings, educational offerings, peer support, etc. If anyone is interested in learning more about this, please reach out to Pastor Hillary or Lynn Rider.

We discussed establishing a Befriender Ministry to train lay people to minister to others.

Over the three years that this committee has been in existence, we have morphed from the substance abuse committee to healing connections. This has occurred because we came to realize that everyone is in need of healing and connection and a faith community is a wonderful place to support one another both in our congregation and in the community. Given this focus, we decided that it would be appropriate to merge our committee into the Church and Society Committee going forward. Some of the members of our committee expressed a willingness to serve on that committee.


The Committee met regularly throughout the year to plan worship, music and other related issues and activities.

Highlights:

- Early in the new year we established a regular maintenance cycle for our new piano and generally enjoyed the addition of this beautiful instrument to our worship life. Duane Nagel was commissioned to build a music shelf to match the new piano and added yet another beautiful piece of furniture to our church.
- Lent included a return to our beloved mid-week suppers and worship including Holden Evening Service. An ensemble of high school youth and adults presented a weekly series of Lenten Dramas entitled *The Commute*. Worship attendance saw a marked increase over the past few years.
- Early in the year the Committee began to discern a revision of our church policy and tradition regarding first communion. The committee entertained a more flexible policy that would allow families to make the decision as to when it was time for their child to partake in Holy Communion. At the same time, we will continue to prepare students for their first communion during their 5th grade school year. A policy was drafted and presented to the Church Council where it was affirmed and instituted at the beginning of the school year.
- A series of five outdoor worship gatherings were held on the first Sunday of each month, June through October. All were held at the waterfront Gazebo and were promoted in part as an evangelizing tool to invite both prospective and lapsed members to worship with us. The July gathering was forced to relocate to Lochner Park because of Mississippi River flooding.
- Two outdoor worship hikes were planned for summer evenings at Lariviere Park. Led by Pastor Hillary they were enjoyed by a smallish but enthusiastic group of pilgrims. In the light of a full harvest moon in October, Pastor Hillary led another hike at Lariviere for our Confirmation students and in early December, a final advent perambulation.



Parish Education Committee Annual Report for 2024

Seasonal Highlights:

Winter / Spring Highlights: There were many highlights from last spring including preparing for the ELCA Youth Gathering, Bible discussions for youth and adults following worship, our First Communion Retreat for 5th grade students, confirmation assembling elder-person care kits, youth serving for Lenten suppers, "Plan-It" retreat at SCBC for pastors and youth leaders, youth involved in Lenten skits and helping to lead worship, Youth-Led Worship services, Graduate Recognition with quilt presentation, and End-of-the-Year parties.



Fall Highlights: The "Faith 5" spiritual practice (Share, Read, Talk, Pray, Bless) were integrating into discipleship ministries. We had a growth in the number of committed adults involved with youth ministries. The fall kick-off events went well, a highlight being the outdoor Rally Sunday event. The 9th Grade retreat at Sugar Creek is always a powerful time together as youth prepare their faith statements in preparation for Confirmation Sunday. The year ended with a wonderful Intergenerational Christmas Program and Christmas parties for Confirmation and High School ministries.

Other Updates:

- Expanded Vacation Bible School offerings: a PreK /K VBS morning and a family VBS afternoon were added. These were in addition to the 4-day VBS Week. Both Confirmation and Sunday School move to a large group teaching with small groups for highs and lows and prayer model.
- ELCA Youth Gathering: We were able to send a group of youth to the ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans over the summer for the first ELCA Youth Gathering since 2018. This is the largest gathering of ELCA Lutherans, and it has a 100+ year history. It was an experience that those that went will never forget. It was a meaningful week of amazing worship times alongside 16,000 other participants, immersive learning, inspiring speakers, and lots of fun.
- Sugar Creek Bible Camp: As members of the Sugar Creek corporation, we have been part owners of this transformational ministry for over 50 years. We were excited to support 18 youth K-12 with \$4330 in camperships for summer 2024. Julian Shedivy was a part of the LEAD program at Sugar Creek Bible Camp, which is a four-week leadership training program. Jasmine Olmstead received this training in 2023. Summer 2025 Brochures with information about summer programs for youth and all ages are available now. We are excited to welcome Deacon Stephanie from Sugar Creek for a High School













Youth Lock-In and a Team-Building Event for middle school and high school youth later this month. We hope to have even more youth attend Sugar Creek for summer 2025.

- Sunday School Re-Design: The Parish Education Committee formed a team to look at different curricula for Sunday School over the summer. The result of that team's work is our newly redesigned Sunday School, "Intergenerational Ministry" that has had wonderful support from parents and other loving adults. The ministry uses a large group / small group model, and incorporates the Faith Five into the rhythm of the day.
- Confirmation Ministry: This ministry transitioned to a Large Group / Small Group model for the fall, which has been a lot of fun. We have 21 youth registered for Confirmation this year, with 6 additional 9th grade students that prepared for their Affirmation of Baptism this year. The new format involves more leaders in mentorship roles, but focuses the teaching preparation on a smaller number of people. This seems to be working well for youth and adults. Highlights include: the fall retreat, ConFest in La Crosse, and a "Worship Walk" with campfire event at La Riviere Park.
- High School Ministry Highlights: Youth-Led Worship in April, End of the Year Party with large group games, ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans Mission Trip Weekend Worship, a Baking Night together, and a growth in participation in regular high school programming (with 7-12 high school youth regularly in attendance).

As a Parish Education Committee, we also accomplished some projects on the policy level alongside the Church Council (and Worship Committee.)

- Expanding First Communion Preparation to all ages- 1st Communion preparation is now open to all children expressing an interest in receiving the sacrament, upon parental agreement and pastoral authorization. If your child has been expressing an interest in beginning to receive Holy Communion, please contact one of the pastors. This was approved by the Church Council with the recommendation of both the Worship and Parish Ed committees.
- Approval of Youth Protection Policy- The Parish Ed committee worked together throughout portions of 2023 and 2024 to create a youth protection policy for St. Peter in order to ensure the safety of all our children, youth, and volunteers. This was approved by the church council. We have begun implementing the policy, which includes training and background checks for volunteers working with children and youth.











Stewardship Annual Report 2024

Committee Members: Michael Douglass, Jackie Eckert, Mike McCoy, Pastor Miranda Klosterboer

The Committee came together in early August and affirmed a planning process and timeline based on a template developed and refined in previous Stewardship planning processes. The Committee continued to meet regularly and frequently throughout the fall, wrapping up work in early December. Committee work continues to be informed by a program entitled *Stewardship for All Seasons* developed ay Pastor Richard G. Sayther.

Identifying *Ministry Goals* was a process of sifting and winnowing information that came from the church council as well as from a detailed ministry evaluation conducted early in 2024. Ultimately three goals were identified, We Care, We Build Discipleship, We Give. A campaign goal was established to increase envelope giving by \$28,000. Moreover, the committee hoped to see an increase in intentional giving in the form of an intent card or commitment to an automated giving program.



Identifying an overall theme took some time and discernment. The title of an early 19th century hymn, from the Southern Methodist tradition, eventually percolated to the top: *What Wondrous Love is This.* This choice in part affirms the important role hymnology plays in articulating our core Lutheran theology and values.

A series of Bulletin Inserts and Temple Talks were planned to more fully explore and explain the stewardship goals. The committee opted to cut back on mailings which, in the wake of an onslaught of political mailings, proved to be wise. A poster was once again designed and exhibited in the church. The whole stewardship planning and sharing process went very smoothly and pretty much stayed on schedule. Individually crafted letters were mailed to congregation members in early November and an *Appeal* weekend was designated on November 16th and 17th.

A generous response was received both in terms of increased envelope planning and intentional giving as articulated by an intent card. By the end of December increase in total giving was \$18,588! Total intent cards, including simply giving was: 75!

A review of the 2024 Stewardship appeal will be held in late January. Feedback, ideas, and other thoughts for this process going forward are most welcome. As a committee we are continually humbled and inspired by the generosity of this congregation. Thanks be to God! Submitted by Michael Douglass

2024 Summary

2024 was another ambitious year of service and support for the St. Peter Women of the ELCA. We met **monthly** for Bible study at Bluff Haven, to include our members who live there. We used the "Gather" magazine study and articles. We also held 9 general business and planning meetings. The group served 9 lunches for member funerals. The Prayer Chain was activated several times for members in need. With congregational and community contributions, our group raised \$3100 for camperships, local Operation Santa, regional storm relief, and national WELCA programming. The quilting group met 10 times (pus members' "home-work" on quilt tops), delivered 85 quilts, 25 health kits, and 25 school kits to Lutheran World Relief, plus a quilt for the Sugar Creek auction, and a quilt for each of St. Peter's graduating



senior students. Members attended Spring and Fall synod women's gatherings, and in addition, hosted the Fall event. Food drives for Souper Bowl Sunday and Thankoffering netted generous amounts of food for Coulee CAP. See the budget for additional mission projects and contributions.

A Report from the 2024 Nominating Committee

A Nominating Committee was elected at the 2024 Annual Meeting consisting of Pat Lenz, Jeff Mink, Dennis Kirschbaum, Jan Weisensale, Rod Boardman and Alex Jackson with Pastor Miranda Klosterboer assisting and advising.

The nominating committee discussed a range of names as possibilities using the most current edition of the Church Directory and considering the terms laid out in the Church Constitution and Bylaws: Church Council members are to worship regularly, receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion often, provide regular financial support of the church, be a supportive presence in word and example, and lead (or be the liaison to) a committee or ministry team.

The Nominating Committee is pleased to bring forward the following slate of nominees.

Lynn Rider has been a resident of Prairie du Chien since 1985 and became a member of St. Peter in 2001. I have served on council and many committees through the 40 years as a member of St. Peter. St. Peter is our church family and a source of strength in dark times and in the best of times. Jan Waller I am 65 years old and a lifelong member of St. Peter. I was born and raised in Prairie du Chien and graduated from Mankato State University in 1982. I was employed at Peoples State Bank from August, 1982 until my retirement in February, 2023. My wife's name is Lori and we have been married going on 42 years. We have two sons, Brent soon to be 41 and Michael (Anjuli) soon to be 38 and two grandchildren. Livey is 4 ½ and Drake is 2. I enjoy time with family and friends and also enjoy being outdoors and taking in the natural beauty of our area.

Alex Jackson just finished her first term on Church Council, serving for two years as Secretary, and will serve for a second partial term of two years. Alex and her husband, Brett, have three boys, Knox (9), Kruse (7), and Merrick (4), and live in Prairie du Chien. Alex works remotely for Emplify Health and enjoys thrifting, reading, decorating, and spending time with friends and family, and Brett is the Assistant Principal at MFL MarMac Middle School. As a family, they enjoy spending time outdoors hiking, sledding, exploring, or at Wyalusing beach in the summertime.

Endowment Committee Annual Report 2024

The Endowment Committee (Pastor Miranda, Rick Lenz, Jan Waller and Lynn Rider) has been meeting for a couple of years. The committee was formed in response to the congregation's approval at an annual meeting.

We started with some materials from the ELCA Foundation about creating a Mission Endowment Fund and also reviewed sample policies from the ELCA and from other churches.

An endowment gift allows a gift to remain in perpetuity with only the income derived from that gift to be spent on an annual basis. We recognize that this type of gift won't be right for everyone who wishes to make a special gift, but establishing an endowment policy provides more flexibility for people wishing to make special gifts. We decided on 4 separate ministries to be supported by endowment gifts: Building – to support facilities and technology, Education and youth – to support education for all ages and youth ministries, Outreach – to support the community, synod, missions of the ELCA, both in the US and worldwide and Budget support – to provide ongoing support for the ministry at St. Peter. The committee had a few concerns about the limited accessibility to the funds and wanted to provide a method for accessing the principal in an emergency situation. We included a provision such that with approval of the majority of the church council and a congregational vote of 2/3 of the voting congregation members, up to one-half of the principal held in the endowment funds can be used for expenditures of an emergency nature. This provision was supported by the ELCA advisor we spoke with. In addition, the committee decided that the funds to be used for building and technology should not have the same limitations on the use of the funds and thus the policy provides that the principal from that fund can be used to support facilities and technology upon approval of the Church Council. After numerous revisions, we finally presented our recommended Endowment Policy to the Church Council in December, and it was approved.

The committee also reviewed the current gift policy and created a new gift policy that was approved by the Gifts and Memorials Committee as well as the Church Council. Copies of both of these policies are available for anyone who wishes to review them. We plan to prepare some brochures for those who wish to give this further consideration.

Planned Giving Options

For those wishing to make gifts to support St. Peter Evangelical Lutheran Church and its ministries (hereafter St. Peter) above and beyond regular giving, we provide several options:

- 1. An unrestricted gift to the church to be invested and used by the Church Council as needed to support St. Peter and its ministries.
- **2.** A gift for a particular purpose (restricted gift) to be used as directed by the donor in accordance with St. Peter's Gift Policy. This could be as part of a capital campaign or could be a special gift approved by the Church Council.
- 3. A gift to the building fund which can be used to maintain the church facilities as well as technology and other physical property needs. These gifts will be subject to the Endowment Policy but unlike other endowment gifts, the principal may be used upon approval of the Church Council.
- **4.** A restricted gift to the endowment fund. The principal of this gift will remain in perpetuity with the annual return of up to 5% to be distributed each year. Restricted gifts shall be designated for one of the following categories:
 - **1. Education/Youth** including but not limited to scholarships, camperships, youth gatherings, youth mission trips
 - 2. Outreach to support the community, synod, missions of the ELCA in the US and worldwide
 - 3. Support of the annual budget and ministry needs of St. Peter
- **5.** An unrestricted gift to the endowment fund. The principal of this gift will remain in perpetuity with the annual return of up to 5% to be distributed each year. The gift shall be distributed to the 4 categories (Building, Education/Youth, Outreach and Budget Support) after consultation with the church council with at least 10% going to the Outreach ministry category.

Finance Committee Report 2024 and 2025

I want to open with a thank you to all the members and friends of St Peter for all you do for the congregation. The finance committee met several times as 2024 was coming to an end and also again during the first week of 2025 looking at the income, expenses, and the investments of St Peter. We thought we would provide a short explanation of a few points to go along with the budget.

I am going to break the 2024 income into two parts. First is our normal income from envelopes, plate offerings, and other income sources. Those sources came to a total of \$344,329 which was within 3% of what we had estimated in the 2024 budget. The second source of income is gifts and bequests which was \$306,460 for 2024. We had estimated \$5000 for the year. St Peter is very fortunate to have received this amount due to some generous donors this past year. Some were direct donations and others were from estates. With these extraordinary gifts we decided to continue our tithe as we have done in the past and sent \$30.646 to be used outside of St Peter operations.

Going into the expenses we budgeted \$380,058 for 2024 but our expenses were \$426,512 for the year. This is where I want to go into some additional details. Our normal operating expenses were just under our projected number for 2024. The church and parsonage were in need of a few updates and we made a decision as a council to do a few of the projects this year with the extra funds from the gifts and bequests. Two projects were approved by the congregation (parsonage roof and the front approach to the church). The other items included new lights in the basement to LED from the old ballast style lights, work on the gutters at the parsonage and church, and radon mitigation systems for the parsonage and church. After everything was done St Peter had a \$224,277 surplus in 2024 which we invested for future needs of St Peter. A very exceptional way to end the year.

Looking at the 2025 budget, it is almost identical to the 2024 budget with an increase that the finance committee feels comfortable with. Total income goes to \$380,757 and expenditures go to \$402,758. This is a projected deficit budget of \$22,002. We wish we could present a balanced budget but we wanted to project numbers as best we could. This budget was presented to the council for approval and was approved and we hope for approval from the congregation. If anyone has questions beyond what is presented please feel free to contact the finance committee with your questions. Thank you for putting your faith in us. 2024 Finance Committee
